A PROCLAMATION

CHILDHOOD CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS:

More than 15,780 children are diagnosed with cancer in the United States every year, and one in 285 kids will be diagnosed with cancer by the time they turn 20. Cancer is the leading cause of death by disease among children between infancy and age 19; and

WHEREAS:

Each year, hundreds of children in Georgia face the battle against cancer, a battle which impacts parents, grandparents, siblings, friends, neighbors, and communities. 1,500 of our nation's children lose their battle with cancer each year, and many infants, children, and teens will suffer from the long-term side effects of comprehensive treatment; and

WHEREAS:

Childhood Cancer Awareness Month serves to increase awareness of childhood cancer, including the need for early detection, proper treatment, research, and attention to late-term effects of treatment on childhood cancer survivors. As a result of greater treatment options, the five-year relative survival rate for childhood cancer is higher than 80 percent; and

WHEREAS:

Several health care professionals, private philanthropies, and social support organizations are dedicated to helping children and their families by offering social, emotional, spiritual, educational, and financial support; and

WHEREAS:

These groups are committed to supporting families and children through the uniquely difficult treatment process and funding more needed research to determine the best treatments and outcomes. The State of Georgia honors the children who have fought and are continuing to fight so bravely against this terrible disease; now

THEREFORE:

I, BRIAN P. KEMP, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim September 2021 as CHILDHOOD CANCER AWARENESS MONTH in Georgia.
