APROCLAMATION

INTERNATIONAL HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE DAY

WHEREAS: On this day in 1945, the Red Army liberated the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp,

freeing the more than 7,000 individuals who were imprisoned there; and

WHEREAS: Just days earlier, the Schutzstaffel, commonly known as the SS, forced nearly 60,000

prisoners to move out of the concentration camp and undertake the infamous Death

Marches, which claimed thousands of innocent lives; and

WHEREAS: On November 1, 2005, the United Nations General Assembly passed a resolution to

establish January 27^{th} as an International Day of Commemoration in memory of the Holocaust victims — the day upon which the world will remember the Holocaust and its

victims each year; and

WHEREAS: The Georgia Commission on the Holocaust was established to remember the victims of

one of the world's most horrific tragedies and promote greatest public awareness of the

history surrounding it; and

WHEREAS: On International Holocaust Remembrance Day and throughout the year, we honor Georgia

Holocaust survivors and liberators, and we further encourage all citizens to promote human

dignity and rebuke evil and hatred whenever and wherever it occurs; now

THEREFORE: I, BRIAN P. KEMP, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim January 27,

2021, as INTERNATIONAL HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE DAY in Georgia.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 27th day of January in the year of our Lord, Two Thousand and Twenty-One.
