# A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

1 To amend Chapter 4 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to 2 vocational, technical, and adult education, so as to provide for the State Board of the 3 Technical College System of Georgia to award high school diplomas; to provide for a pilot 4 program by the State Board of the Technical College System of Georgia which allows 5 students who are 16 years of age or older, who have completed certain coursework 6 requirements, and who have withdrawn from such secondary school, to enroll in the Dual 7 Achieve Program at a technical college of this state and achieve a high school diploma in 8 conjunction with successful completion of the program; to provide for the purposes of the 9 pilot program; to provide for requirements for student eligibility to participate in and 10 complete the program; to provide for waivers and variances; to provide for definitions; to 11 provide for rules and regulations; to provide for a repealer; to amend Chapter 2 of Title 20 12 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to elementary and secondary education, 13 so as to provide for notice requirements for students under age 18 before withdrawing from 14 a public secondary school in this state; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting 15 laws; and for other purposes.

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## BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

# PART I.

## SECTION 1-1.

19 Chapter 4 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to vocational,20 technical, and adult education, is amended in Code Section 20-4-11, relating to powers of the

21 board, by revising paragraphs (1), (2), and (10) and inserting a new paragraph to read as 22 follows:

23 "20-4-11.

24 The State Board of the Technical College System of Georgia shall be empowered to:

25 (1) Provide for a comprehensive program of literacy, career, occupational, and technical 26 education for adults and out-of-school youths. Such program shall promote the economic 27 well-being of Georgia citizens by providing high quality postsecondary technical and 28 adult education and literacy programs, services, and activities which are easily accessible 29 by all segments of the adult population who need and can benefit from training, 30 retraining, or upgrade training for employment and which is highly responsive to 31 individuals needing to achieve basic, general, and specialized literacy. Such program 32 shall also provide an opportunity for individuals, including out-of-school youths, who 33 have reached age 16 and who meet certain criteria provided for in this chapter, to attain 34 a high school diploma in conjunction with the completion of one or more other 35 components of the postsecondary technical program. Such program shall also provide 36 a system of schools which is a full partner in the economic development and expansion 37 of the state's economic base and represents a significant asset in the attraction of new 38 business and industry to the state and the expansion of existing business and industry in 39 the state:

40 (2) Establish and promulgate standards, rules, regulations, and policies for the orderly
 41 and efficient operation of the Technical College System of Georgia and of postsecondary
 42 technical schools, programs, and institutions, including those which it operates and those

43 operated by local and area boards of education, and for the orderly and efficient provision
44 of adult <del>literacy</del> education <u>and literacy</u> programs:

45 (A) Such standards, rules, regulations, and policies may include but not be limited to 46 developing criteria for the recruitment, employment and retention of faculty and staff: 47 recruitment of students and student admissions; program approval, salaries and salary 48 supplements, tuition, and fees; eligibility of public and private providers of adult 49 literacy education programs for state and federal funds, levels of funding for such 50 providers and associated levels of required provider matching funds; long and short-term planning to include facilities, program standards, and outcome 51 52 competencies; establishing provisions for appropriate recognition of program 53 achievement below the baccalaureate level; soliciting resources from the private sector; 54 industry and education partnerships; research and data collection; representing 55 postsecondary technical and adult literacy education in all forums; and such other 56 functions necessary to assure an effective and efficient state-wide system of 57 postsecondary technical schools and adult literacy education with leadership at the state 58 level; and

59 (B) For adult <u>education and</u> literacy programs, the state board shall establish:

(i) <u>Comprehensive and detailed standards</u> One set of standards for public <u>and private</u>
 adult <u>education and</u> literacy providers <del>and another set of standards for private adult</del>
 <u>education and</u> literacy providers. The public standards shall be more comprehensive
 and detailed than the private standards; and

64 (ii) Standards and requirements for the attainment of a high school equivalency
65 certificate which shall be comparable to the high school graduation requirements set
66 by the State Board of Education for public school programs and which shall also be
67 at least equal to the requirements established for a general educational development
68 (GED) diploma. The State Board of the Technical College System of Georgia state

board shall also adopt and administer an instrument to measure the level of
achievement required to obtain a high school equivalency certificate; and

(iii) Standards and requirements for the attainment of a high school diploma
 conferred by the state board which shall be comparable to the high school graduation

73 requirements set by the State Board of Education for public school programs;"

74 "(10)(A) Approve a request by a postsecondary technical school or institution governed 75 under this chapter to be named a technical college upon the approval and granting of 76 occupational degree-granting status by the State Board of the Technical College System 77 of Georgia and upon receiving accreditation by the Commission on Colleges of the 78 Southern Association of Schools, the Council on Occupational Education, or any other 79 appropriate accrediting agency approved by the United States Secretary of Education. 80 The use of the name technical college shall not alter the governance of the technical 81 school or institution as established under this chapter nor shall it abridge the authority 82 of the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia under the Constitution of 83 this state; and

84 (B) Award high school diplomas as provided for in this chapter; and"

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### **SECTION 1-2.**

86 Said chapter is further amended by revising Code Section 20-4-18, relating to management
87 and control of adult literacy and postsecondary technical education programs and schools,
88 as follows:

89 "20-4-18.

Subject to the provisions of Code Section 20-4-20, any other Code section of this article to the contrary notwithstanding, all decisions regarding the delivery of adult literacy and postsecondary technical education programs and services to business, industry, and individuals who are 16 years of age or older and who have completed or left the public schools, to include the awarding of high school equivalency certificates and diplomas, shall 96 the system shall exercise state level management and operational control over adult literacy

97 education programs, postsecondary technical schools, and adult vocational centers."

99 Said chapter is further amended by adding a new article to read as follows:

100	"ARTICLE 6
101	<u>20-4-140.</u>
102	(a) As used in this article, the term:
103	(1) 'Dual Achievement Program' or 'program' means the program provided for in this
104	article.
105	(2) 'Eligible student' means a student who meets the qualifications to participate in the
106	program.
107	(3) 'State board' means the State Board of the Technical College System of Georgia.
108	(4) 'Technical college system' means the Technical College System of Georgia.
109	<u>20-4-141.</u>
110	(a)(1) The state board shall, in coordination with the State Board of Education,
111	Department of Education, the Department of Juvenile Justice, the Department of
112	Corrections, and the Office of Planning and Budget, establish a pilot program to allow
113	students who meet eligibility requirements to qualify for enrollment in the Dual
114	Achievement Program at a participating unit of the technical college system and, upon
115	successful completion of the program, be awarded a high school diploma. The purpose
116	of the pilot program is to assess the feasibility of implementing a state-funded program

117 for eligible students who have withdrawn from high school to enroll in a unit of the

118	technical college system to participate in an academic and technical education and
119	training program which, upon successful completion, allows the student to earn a high
120	school diploma while also earning a technical college associate degree, a technical
121	college diploma, or technical college certificates of credit in specific career pathways.
122	(2) To implement the pilot program, notwithstanding any other provision of law to the
123	contrary, the State Board of the Technical College System of Georgia and the State Board
124	of Education shall be authorized to waive or provide variances to state rules, regulations,
125	policies, and procedures and to provisions of this title that may be reasonably necessary
126	to meet the goals of the pilot program. Such waivers or variances shall automatically
127	expire at the end of five years unless an earlier expiration is provided for. The State
128	Board of the Technical College System of Georgia and the State Board of Education shall
129	be authorized to seek waivers or variances of federal laws, rules, regulations, policies,
130	and procedures that may be reasonably necessary to meet the goals of the pilot program.
131	(3) The pilot program, as determined by the state board, may include up to five units of
132	the technical college system for a period of five years. In an effort to pilot the program
133	under various conditions present in the state, the state board shall seek to include in the
134	pilot program units of the technical college system from various geographic areas in the
135	state.
136	(4) The state board shall review the results of the pilot program and shall no later than
137	February 1 each year during the program provide the General Assembly with a
138	comprehensive report on the program with any recommendations for its continued use
139	and any needed changes in the program. Such report shall include a comprehensive list
140	any such waivers or variances requested as provided for in paragraph (2) of this
141	subsection, a statement of necessity for each request, and whether each request was
142	granted in whole or in part.

- (b) The pilot program established by the state board pursuant to this article shall provide 143
- 144 for the award of a high school diploma to students who successfully complete the program.

145 (c) The state board shall determine the specific competencies concerning the skills and 146 knowledge needed for completion of each component of the program; provided, however, 147 that the state board shall make such determination regarding the skills and knowledge 148 needed to meet the requirements for a high school diploma as provided for in this program 149 in consultation with the State Board of Education and the Department of Education. (d) In order to minimize the risk of prospective students prematurely withdrawing from 150 a secondary school in order to participate in the program, the state board shall provide for 151 152 preliminary review of academic records, including, but not limited to official secondary school transcripts, submitted by prospective students to determine whether such students 153 154 meet the requirements provided for in paragraphs (1) and (2) of subsection (e) of this Code Section. If a prospective student meets such requirements, the student shall be so notified 155 and allowed to complete a readiness assessment required by the technical college system. 156 157 Students who meet the requirements provided for in paragraphs (1) and (2) of 158 subsection (e) of this Code Section and attain a score of admission acceptable on the 159 readiness assessment shall be notified that they are eligible to participate in the program, 160 subject to meeting the requirements provided for in paragraphs (4) and (5) of subsection (e) 161 of this Code Section. 162 (e) To be eligible to participate in the program, a student shall: 163 (1) Be 16 years of age or older; 164 (2) Have completed at least six of the nine following state required ninth and tenth grade 165 level high school courses: two English courses, two mathematics courses, two science 166 courses, two social studies courses, and one health and physical education course; and 167 any state required tests associated with any such courses: 168 (3) Receive a score of admission acceptable on the readiness assessment required by the 169 technical college system; 170 (4) Provide the following: 171 (A) If an unemancipated minor:

172	(i) Verification that the student's parent or legal guardian attended a conference with
173	the student's high school principal or the principal's designee as provided for in
174	subsection (e) of Code Section 20-2-690.1;
175	(ii) A copy of the form provided for in subsection (e) of Code Section 20-2-690.1
176	signed by the student's parent or legal guardian;
177	(iii) Written acknowledgment by the student's parent or guardian that withdrawal of
178	the student from secondary school may result in loss of eligibility for
179	accommodations, specialized instruction, and other services pursuant to the federal
180	Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C.A. Section 1400, et seq., and
181	Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C.A. Section 701, et
182	seq.; and
183	(iv) Written acknowledgment that the high school diploma available through the Dual
184	Achievement Program requires successful completion of the program; or
185	(B) If an emancipated minor or a student who is 18, 19, or 20 years of age:
186	(i) Written acknowledgment that the student has conferred with his or her secondary
187	school principal or the principal's designee or a qualified designated official of the
188	technical college system and discussed alternatives to withdrawing from high school
189	without completing graduation requirements and potential consequences of not having
190	a high school diploma, including lower lifetime earnings, fewer jobs for which the
191	student will be qualified, and the inability to avail oneself of higher educational
192	opportunities.
193	(ii) Written acknowledgment by the student's parent or guardian that withdrawal of
194	the student from secondary school may result in loss of eligibility for
195	accommodations, specialized instruction, and other services pursuant to the federal
196	Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C.A. Section 1400, et seq., and
197	Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C.A. Section 701, et
198	seq.; and

- 199 (iii) Written acknowledgment that the high school diploma available through the
- 200 Dual Achievement Program requires successful completion of the program; and
- 201 (5) Be withdrawn from a public secondary school of this state.
- 202 (f) The state board shall award a high school diploma to a student enrolled in the program
- 203 provided for in this article who:
- 204 (1) Completes all student counseling and assessment requirements of the program;
- 205 (2) Completes rigorous coursework at a participating unit of the technical college
- 206 <u>system; and</u>
- 207 <u>(3) Completes:</u>
- 208 (A) A technical college associate degree program;
- 209 (B) A technical college diploma program; or
- 210 (C) At least two technical college certificate of credit programs in one specific career
- 211 <u>pathway.</u>
- 212 (g) A student who meets the requirements of subsections (f) of this Code section shall be
- 213 deemed to have met all graduation requirements of the State Board of Education and shall
- 214 not be subject to any assessments otherwise required for purposes of graduation.
- 215 (h) The state board, in consultation with the State Board of Education, Department of
- 216 Education, the Department of Juvenile Justice, the Department of Corrections, and the
- 217 Office of Planning and Budget, shall establish rules and regulations to implement the
- 218 provisions of this article.
- 219 <u>20-4-142.</u>
- 220 This article shall stand repealed on July 1, 2026."

# PART II. SECTION 2-1.

223 Chapter 2 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to elementary and secondary education, is amended in Code Section 20-2-690.1, relating to mandatory 224 education for children between ages six and sixteen, by revising subsection (e) as follows: 225 226 "(e) An unemancipated minor who is older than the age of mandatory attendance as 227 required in subsection (a) of this Code section who has not completed all requirements for 228 a high school diploma who wishes to withdraw from school shall have the written 229 permission of his or her parent or legal guardian prior to withdrawing. Prior to accepting 230 such permission, the school principal or designee shall convene a conference with the child 231 and parent or legal guardian within two school days of receiving notice of the intent of the 232 child to withdraw from school. The principal or designee shall make a reasonable attempt 233 to share with the student and parent or guardian the educational options available, including the opportunity to pursue a general educational development (GED) diploma and the 234 235 consequences of not having earned a high school diploma, including lower lifetime 236 earnings, fewer jobs for which the student will be qualified, and the inability to avail 237 oneself of higher educational opportunities. Every local board of education shall adopt a 238 policy on the process of voluntary withdrawal of unemancipated minors who are older than 239 the mandatory attendance age. The policy shall be filed with the Department of Education 240 no later than January 1, 2007. The Department of Education shall provide annually to all 241 local school superintendents model forms for the parent or guardian signature requirement 242 contained in this subsection and updated information from reliable sources relating to the 243 consequences of withdrawing from school without completing all requirements for a high 244 school diploma. Such form shall include information relating to the opportunity to pursue 245 a general educational development (GED) diploma and the consequences of not having 246 earned a high school diploma, including lower lifetime earnings, fewer jobs for which the

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247	student will be qualified, and the inability to avail oneself of higher educational
248	opportunities. Such form shall also include information regarding potential loss of
249	eligibility for accommodations, specialized instruction, and other services pursuant to the
250	federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C.A. Section 1400, et seq., and
251	Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C.A. Section 701, et seq.
252	Each local school superintendent shall provide such forms and information to all of its
253	principals of schools serving grades six through twelve for the principals to use during the
254	required conference with the child and parent or legal guardian."
255	PART III.
256	SECTION 3-1.

257 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
