A PROCLAMATION

RETT SYNDROME AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS: Rett Syndrome is a postnatal genetic neurological disorder that occurs primarily

in females, with symptoms usually appearing around 6 to 18 months; and

WHEREAS: A regression period leads to lifelong impairments with multiple dysfunctions:

speech is lost, seizures can develop, scoliosis can occur, many develop irregular breathing patterns, and many people lose their ability to walk. A hallmark sign

of Rett Syndrome is near constant repetitive hand movements; and

WHEREAS: Those diagnosed with Rett Syndrome can require assistance with daily living

activities, but the disorder is not degenerative and biomedical research in mice suggests that neurological symptoms may be reversed even after decades of

severe symptoms; and

WHEREAS: With the discovery of the gene that causes Rett Syndrome, research in the lab

supporting the theory of reversibility of the disease, the discovery of breakthrough testing in vitro models, and the launch of multiple diseasemodifying human clinical trials, those affected by Rett Syndrome now have hope

that they will soon have relief; and

WHEREAS: This month and throughout the year, efforts are continuing to bring awareness

to the medical community, therapists, teachers, caregivers, and the general public as well while researchers remain dedicated to finding a cure for Rett

Syndrome; now

THEREFORE: I, BRIAN P. KEMP, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim

October 2022, RETT SYNDROME AWARENESS MONTH in Georgia.
