A PROCLAMATION

YOM HASHOAH HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE DAY

WHEREAS:The Holocaust was the state-sponsored, systematic persecution and annihilation of Six
Million European Jews by the Nazi regime and its collaborators between 1933 and
1945; during the era of the Holocaust, German authorities also targeted Roma, Poles,
people with disabilities, homosexuals, Jehovah's Witnesses, Soviet prisoners of war,
and political dissidents for oppression, destruction, or decimation; and

WHEREAS: The history of the Holocaust offers an opportunity to reflect on the moral responsibilities of individuals, societies, and governments; and

WHEREAS:Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day, is observed on the 27th day of Nisan
in the Hebrew calendar representing Israel's day of commemoration for the Six Million
Jewish people including 1.5 million children who perished in the Holocaust and
honoring the survivors, rescuers, and liberators of the Holocaust; and

WHEREAS:"The Memorial to the Six Million," at Greenwood Cemetery, dedicated on April 25,
1965, has stood for more than 59 years as Eternal Life-Hemshech's greatest tribute to
the memories of Holocaust victims, and is a testament to our commitment to honor
the lives lost to the Holocaust; and

WHEREAS:To correspond with the observance of Yom HaShoah in Israel, Eternal Life-
Hemshech, The Breman Jewish Heritage Museum and The Jewish Federation of
Greater Atlanta, which have made exceptional educational contributions to the State
of Georgia, will observe the 57th Annual Community-wide Yom HaShoah Holocaust
Commemoration at the Memorial to the Six Million on May 5, 2024; now

THEREFORE: I, BRIAN P. KEMP, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim May 5, 2024, as YOM HASHOAH: HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE DAY in Georgia.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 21st day of March in the year of our Lord, Two Thousand and Twenty-Four.
