## **A PROCLAMATION**

## ELHERS-DANLOS SYNDROME AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS: Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome (EDS) is a rare, chronic, and lifelong disease that one in

5,000 people worldwide are affected primarily by their joints, ligaments, skin and blood

vessel walls; and

WHEREAS: Individuals with EDS have a group of inherited disorders of the connective tissue

which cause a wide range of symptoms including but not limited to extremely fragile skin, flexible joints that hyper extend and cause dislocations, muscle weakness, organ

prolapse, heart problems, abnormal wound healing and bruising; and

WHEREAS: Due to the wide variability in EDS symptoms that intertwine and overlap with other

related disorders, the most efficient and appropriate management for medical

intervention can be challenging, involute, and elaborate; and

WHEREAS: A network of EDS support systems and groups can help connect people who are living

with and having to manage life with these chronic conditions and better inform

healthcare providers and the public at large; and

WHEREAS: There is currently no cure, nor routine screening for EDS. Accurate and early diagnosis

can provide the opportunity for appropriate medical intervention at a timely manner when needed and an overall better quality of life. Treatment is based on managing symptoms when they occur and trying to prevent injuries from happening that could

cause dangerous complications; and

WHEREAS: Raising further awareness can help lead to improved treatment options and provide a

better understanding of the disorders and the individuals who have them; now

**THEREFORE:** I, BRIAN P. KEMP, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim May 2025

as ELHERS-DANLOS SYNDROME AWARENESS MONTH in Georgia.
