A PROCLAMATION

LYME AND TICK-BORNE DISEASE AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS:	Lyme disease is an infectious disease caused by spirochetal bacteria, or Borrelia burgdorferi, and transmitted through the bite of infected black-legged ticks; and
WHEREAS:	Lyme and other tick-borne diseases are prevalent across the United States. With ticks so frequently encountered by Georgia citizens across many parts of the state, it is important for citizens to be informed of the risks they carry; and
WHEREAS:	Improper removal of embedded ticks is dangerous and can increase the risk of infection. However, prompt treatment in early stage infection may cure Lyme and other tick-borne diseases, preventing permanent damage or future complications; and
WHEREAS:	Lyme disease has the potential to affect the brain, heart, joints, and other body organs, mimicking the symptoms of several other diseases. Symptoms of Lyme disease vary for each individual patient and also vary in intensity throughout the duration of the disease. Many are misdiagnosed with other familiar conditions; and
WHEREAS:	The science that surrounds Lyme and other tick-borne diseases remains unclear, prompting the need for citizens and healthcare providers to take all tick-borne diseases seriously to prevent unnecessary illness; and
WHEREAS:	The State of Georgia encourages citizens to learn more about Lyme and other tick-borne diseases, allowing them to better protect themselves against infection; now
THEREFORE:	I, BRIAN P. KEMP, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim May 2019 as LYME AND TICK-BORNE DISEASE AWARENESS MONTH in Georgia.
