## A PROCLAMATION

## RETT SYNDROME AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS:

Rett syndrome is a rare postnatal genetic neurological disorder that occurs

almost exclusively in females, and rarely males; and

WHEREAS:

Every two hours a girl is born with Rett syndrome, but its symptoms usually do

not appear until six to eighteen months of age; and

WHEREAS:

A regression period follows where acquired motor skills are lost, leading to lifelong impairments including loss of speech, seizures, scoliosis, and irregular breathing patterns. More than half of those affected lose their ability to walk. The hallmark sign of Rett syndrome is near constant repetitive hand movements

while awake; and

WHEREAS:

Those diagnosed with Rett syndrome require maximum assistance with daily

living activities; and

WHEREAS:

The disorder is not degenerative and biomedical research in mice suggests that

neurological symptoms may be reversed even after decades of severe symptoms;

and

WHEREAS:

With the discovery of the gene that causes Rett syndrome in 1999, lab research that proves the theory of reversibility of the disease in 2007, the discovery of breakthrough testing in vitro models in 2010, and the launch of six disease-modifying human clinical trials and more in the pipeline, we have reached an

unprecedented and historic moment in time; and

WHEREAS:

Rett Syndrome Awareness Month provides an important opportunity to bring awareness to the medical community, therapists, teachers, caregivers, and the

general public; now

THEREFORE:

I, BRIAN P. KEMP, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim October 2019 as RETT SYNDROME AWARENESS MONTH in Georgia.
